#### FREE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

Technical Assistance provides free service in the areas of licensing and compliance issues, children with special needs and behavioral issues and classroom practices or concerns. It also helps providers with programs such as Accreditation, Excels and Credentialing. Technical Assistance is a service that offers you and your program whatever help you may need in order to provide a higher quality of care.

#### ON TRACK: ALL ABOARD FOR DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRESS

In July of 2016, a regulation will take effect that will require all licensed early care and education programs (child care centers and family child care home providers) to conduct developmental screening on children aged birth through five years. The initial cost for the developmental screening tool chosen by the child care facility will be covered by MSDE.

Each day child care professionals observe the children in their care for developmental milestones to better plan activities and learning opportunities. Using a recognized, validated developmental screening tool helps parents and providers in identifying strengths and potential areas where additional resources and a referral may be needed. MSDE identified the following developmental screening tools that would meet the regulation requirements:

- Ages & Stages Questionnaires Third Edition (ASQ-3),
- Best Beginnings Developmental Screen
- Brigance Early Childhood Screen III,
- Developmental Indicators for the Assessment of Learning Fourth Edition (DIAL-4), and
- Early Screening Inventory—Revised 2008 Edition (ESI-R).

The tools can be reviewed at the Child Resource Center Baltimore County at Abilities Network/Project ACT.

#### SUPPORTING YOUR INFANT'S AND TODDLER'S BRAIN



You may think that I am going to go into all this current research (okay, I may a little) and discuss complex ways to support the growth of your young child's brain. However... there is one simple way to do this. BUILD TRUSTING RELATIONSHIPS.

By building strong, trusting relationships (and encouraging parents to build these strong relationships) you are forming an important foundation for all learning later in life. I know many of you have been an early childhood educator for a very long time and know this to just be common sense. Well, here is the research to back up all that wonderful work you have been doing!

According to Zero to Three, "These trusting relationships foster the social and emotional skills—confidence, persistence, self-regulation, attentiveness, and ability to form relationships that set infants and toddlers on the path to being confident learners, productive workers, and emotionally competent human beings."

Now imagine, if you will, that there is a child that did not gain any of these foundational skills between the ages of birth to three due to not having a responsive adult around. Now imagine that child in elementary school. This child is probably having a difficult time working as a team member to complete a classroom project. This child cannot sit and pay attention during a lesson, which means he continuously fails his tests. Now imagine this child as an adult. This adult is probably having difficulties getting his dream job because he lacks any self-confidence to shoot for the stars. Now this may be an exaggeration, however, it may not.



Here are some wonderful ways that you as a provider can help support this brain development through building trusting relationships:

Be a responsive caregiver- This basically means that you are meeting their needs. When you do this, you are showing this child you can be trusted because you are protecting them and keeping them healthy. This means that when the infant is crying because they're hungry, you feed them. When they are tired, you give them a safe place to lay. When they need a hug, you're there to offer it to them.

Use face time often- Make sure that you are incorporating lots of face to face time and mirror play into your lessons. When feeding an infant their bottle, hold them, make eye contact, and talk to them. Do you have an infant who hates tummy time or is having a difficult time picking up their head? Get down on the floor and do tummy time with them. Your face is the most interesting and motivating thing to your infant. You can also create little books with actual pictures of family members and of you, the teacher.


Form trusting relationships with the families- Our infants and toddlers pay attention to more than we may think they do. They notice that Mommy and Daddy are happy also during drop off. They notice your reactions and their family's reactions when you are communicating. When they feel secure that Mommy and Daddy are okay leaving me with this person, the child builds a stronger trusting relationship with you.

**Registration:** Registration is available on a first come first serve basis. Registration is not considered complete until payment is received. Registration and payment is due BEFORE a participant may attend a training.

#### MARYLAND CHILD CARE SUBSIDY PROGRAN TO CENTRALIZE CASE MANAGEMENT

Starting Monday, August 31, the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) Child Care Subsidy (CCS) program will centralize case management functions.

What will this change mean for customers?

The CCS program will move from local Department of Social Services (DSS) offices to a centralized processing center, CCS Central, August 31, 2015. CCS Central contact postcards will be available for customers that might visit a local DSS office once CCS Central has opened.

CCS Central will offer CCS families easy access to application or subsidy/voucher information at a toll-free number, where any customer service representative can help.

A new automated phone menu also will provide CCS applicants and customers with details about their CCS application or case 24 hours/day, 7 days/week.

CCS Central will receive application and verification documents by mail, FAX or email, so customers won't have to travel to a local office to drop off documents.

Current customers will receive notification through US Mail of the upcoming CCS program changes and CCS Central contact information.

What will this change mean for child care providers?

Payment processing for providers will now occur at the same processing center as case management – CCS Central will be staffed with Child Care Subsidy experts to help with whatever is needed.

Centralized case management and provider payment processing will promote accuracy and consistency throughout CCS Central.

Providers also will receive information on the CCS program changes through US Mail prior to the implementation.

How will families apply for CCS after August 31st?

Interested applicants can call CCS Central to request an application be mailed to them.

This application can be printed, completed, signed and sent to CCS Central by FAX or mail. Soon, the application will be replaced with a fillable PDF that can be typed on the computer, printed, signed and FAXed or mailed to CCS Central.
